

FENCING

This year under the direction of a new coach, Mr. Oscar Parsons, the Clark fencers made great strides. Interest in fencing has greatly increased in the student body among non-participants as well the members of the team, as evidenced by the large turnout at matches that were held on campus.

At mid-year, the boys had an average of .500 having defeated the University of Connecticut 14-13, and howing to Wesleyan by a small margin. Matches against Trinity College and the Harvard Frosh took place in the spring.

At press time Feinberg and Lubarsky had won five out of their six matches and Co-captains Kistler and Bliss as well as Good and Petrell had won half of theirs.

In retrospect, the Clark Tennis Team had another fine season in 1951 in spite of its record of three wins to six losses. The latter were all colleges of Clark's caliber, and it is significant that they were beaten. Some of the large schools which defeated our smaller team were Springfield, Tufts, University of Massachusetts, and Holy Cross. Many from last year's team were still with us this season.

Mainstays on the Scarlet in 1952 were: Co-captains, Kenneth Streingold and James Holton; Richard Nelson, Gene Chin, Steve Jennings, and Leon Albert. The team was capably managed by Richard Sussman and Joe Hickey.

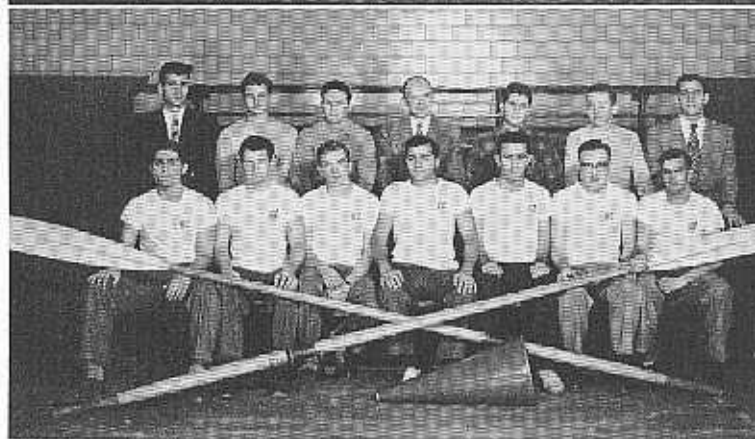
CREW
