I. Internet Sites

Global synthetic-aperture radar data collected on 2 flights of the Space Shuttle in 1994 & 1995 have been made available at **SARA: The Synthetic Aperture Radar Atlas**. The atlas is a collaborative project of the Jet Propulsion Lab, the San Diego Super Computer Center, California Institute of Technology, & the University of Lecce (Italy). The resolution of the data is approximately 12 meters per pixel. (<http://www.cacr.caltech.edu/~roy/sara/>)

NOAA's Central Library has developed a comprehensive Internet Resource Locator for science and policy sites concerned with oceanic & atmospheric topics. **WINDandSEA** contains over 800 links arranged by topics, including sections on mapping & remote sensing. On April 1, 1999, Canada's Northwest Territories officially splits and the eastern portion will become Nunavut. **The Nunavut Handbook** offers an excellent introduction to the area's geography, history, wildlife, people & culture. Also included are maps & travel information. (<http://www.arctic-travel.com>)

Two useful calculators have been made available by the Professional Excellence Group: the **Exact Conversion of Minutes of Latitude & Longitude to Yards/Feet/Meters** and the **Quick and Dirty Conversion Between Minutes of Latitude and Longitude and Yards/Feet/Meters**. Another gazetteer has been added to the already multitudinous array of online reference sources. The Getty Information Institute has released the Web version of the **Getty Thesaurus of Geographic Names**.
