Introduction to the Major

Students in international development and social change (IDSC) envision a more just world and gain the tools to make that world possible.

IDSC majors learn about the dynamics that shape our world with the aim of promoting equity and justice. Through classwork and community-based learning, students gain a deep understanding of the interplay of international, regional, and local dynamics as they prepare to become agents of social change. Students explore the varied institutions and actors that advance the global development agenda and learn about alternatives to mainstream development.

CORE COURSES

As an IDSC major, you will learn about global political and economic structures, global environmental challenges, the distribution of power across lines of geography, race, and class, and the history of global poverty and inequality. Foundational courses in the major include:


- Tales from the Far Side: Issues in International Development




Ready to launch?
