HIGHLIGHTS

Courses in the studio art major offer you an opportunity to engage in the study and practice of visual language. Since art is a way of communicating human experience, you learn to both read this language and visually represent your own ideas.

Introduction to the Major

Engage your eyes, mind, and hands in the studio art major to develop your creative skills, working closely with our dedicated faculty.

In studio art, learn to express your individual perspective on the world through drawing, painting, photography, printmaking, sculpture, video, and graphic design. With every work you produce, you will place another marker on your path to a creative career. Your Clark portfolio will enable you to pursue an advanced degree at leading art and design schools, or work in diverse industries and institutions including arts organizations and print, digital, and broadcast media.

CORE COURSES

Training in artistic methods and media is provided within a supportive liberalarts environment that offers a variety of perspectives to fuel your creativity. A single major includes 11 studio art courses and three art history courses. If you double major, eight studio art courses and two art history courses are required.

- Begin with Visual Studies: 2D Design and Color and/or Drawing: Eye, Mind, Hand
- Take three 200-level studio art courses
- Six studio art electives
- Three art history electives
- Complete one capstone

Explore the studio art program

Visit the Traina Center to see the studio art classrooms and meet your faculty.



Learn about campus resources

Explore student resources related to academic support, campus life, career development, diversity and inclusion, and health and wellness.



Identify potential Program of Liberal Studies (PLS) courses

You are required to take eight PLS courses over four years. Talk with your adviser to start identifying courses that match your interests and goals.



Get connected

Introduce yourself to faculty, reach out to fellow classmates, and join a student organization on campus such as Clark University Film Society, STIR Magazine, The Scarlet student newspaper, or Clark University Players Society.



Explore off campus

Check out the local arts scene at Arts Worcester, the Worcester Art Museum, and the Technocopia makerspace.



Reflect on what sparks your interest

After exploring various media and areas of focus, what interests you the most? You may concentrate in one or more areas and seek out faculty members for personal mentoring.



Declare your major

In Year 2, you should declare your major and decide if you will double major in another area of study.



Engage in the practice of visual language

You are learning to read visual language and represent your own ideas. Training in artistic methods and media is provided in the context of intellectual inquiry and critical analysis.



Start networking

Clark is committed to action-based learning, which means as an undergraduate you can join faculty and graduate students in their creative work. Start making connections with faculty and peers to see if there are opportunities you would like to be part of.



Pursue another point of view

Consider taking a PLS course in another area of the Visual and Performing Arts Department. Study abroad at the Burren College of Art in Ireland or the Siena Program in Italy to broaden your experience.



Do a pre-flight check

As you move from Year 2 to Year 3 in your studies, work with your adviser to make sure you are on track with coursework and talk about your goals for the next two years. Visit the Career Lab in ASEC to get your resume ready for an on- or off-campus opportunity.

Pull it all together

ARTS 234 Studio Topics is designed as a capstone experience for majors. Unlike many other studio art courses that are workshop oriented and involve in-class practice, these class meetings are devoted to discussion, presentation, and critique. Creative work is undertaken independently.



Show your work

Students with a strong commitment to intensive study may elect to undertake a senior thesis project, which culminates in an exhibition of work in the Schiltkamp Gallery.
