Introduction to the Major

Challenge convention: Speak Spanish! As a global language, Spanish is essential for business, health, politics, culture, and education.

Why study Spanish at Clark? Build linguistic and cultural competencies that will enable you to work with Spanish speakers in the U.S. or live in a different country after graduation. Learn from faculty members who research diverse aspects of Hispanic culture including cinema, literature, politics, race, and sexuality and gender studies. Participate in courses that connect with local organizations. Interact with political activists and artists.

CORE COURSES

Nine courses are required to complete the Spanish major including The National Imagination, which explores how languages have been used to build cultural identity. A study abroad experience is strongly encouraged, and a maximum of four associated literature or culture courses may count toward the major requirements. Courses in the major include:

- Cultural and literary analysis
- Translation and media
- Hispanic culture and arts
- Community engagement and social change
- Language and literature
- Theater, drama, and film


