Introduction to the Major

Intellectually curious? Ready to explore and discover? Eager to connect with others? Then check out the French and Francophone studies major!

By studying the French language and the literatures and cultures of French-speaking societies, students learn to see differently and to think critically about the world. What do language and literature tell us about a given society or time period? Our students interrogate structures of power, analyze discourse and narrative, consider questions of identity and social relations across the Francophone world, and come to understand how such interrogations relate to their own lives.

CORE COURSES

In the core literature courses, you will become familiar with textual analysis of works representing various time periods and literary traditions. The core culture courses turn a critical eye to film, texts, and the arts to explore cultural and societal realities of the Francophone world and the history that shaped them. Courses in the major include:

- Popular Culture in France
- Readings in French and Francophone Literature
- Cultural criticism courses in French
- The National Imagination
- Capstone in French and Francophone studies
- Study abroad in France or Senegal



Take the senior French and Francophone studies capstone course. Make sure you complete all 200-level requirements.

Connect with alumni

Ask about their experiences in the job market, graduate or law school. How have their language skills and cultural knowledge benefited them professionally and personally?



Finish strong

Be sure to have completed all major core requirements and electives. Identify faculty who know you well and will serve as references or write letters of recommendation.

Apply to be an English language teaching assistant at the University of Versailles or another school in France through the TAPIF or Fulbright program after graduation.



Get ready to launch

Attend a career fair to learn about potential paths & opportunities. Find ways to demonstrate qualities such as leadership, teamwork, problem-solving, and initiative.

Reflect on your intellectual growth and how you have changed. What have you learned that you value? What action steps do you need to take this year to finish strong?
