Introduction to the Major

Widen your circle of conversation and be prepared to forge connections across languages and cultures near and far.

The combined languages major focuses on the study of languages and cultures to better understand political dynamics, historical shifts, religious differences, and international relations, which are all more important than ever in our increasingly global society. Explore and critique how languages have been used to build and promote cultural identity and continuity. Learn from faculty members who research diverse literary and linguistic traditions around the world.

CORE COURSES

Fourteen courses are required in the major, including eight in languages, four complementary courses, two units of study abroad, and a capstone. The National Imagination is a foundational course that explores how language and cultural productions have been used to build, question, and challenge cultural identities. Courses in the major include:

- Analyzing Stories and Poems
- Popular Culture in France
- Contemporary Literary Theory
- Japanese Pop Culture
- Combined languages capstone in Spanish or French
