## **Introduction to the Major**

Storytelling is at the center of human life. Prepare to examine and embrace diverse ways to represent our complex humanity.

The comparative literature major is an interdisciplinary program that will provide you with experiences and skills essential to succeeding in today's complex world. You will develop valuable critical thinking, communication, and creative skills and learn from faculty who research diverse literary traditions around the world, paying particular attention to the way art, literature, film, and diverse cultural productions are developed in constant dialogue with narratives at local, national, and global levels.

#### **CORE COURSES**

At least eight courses in literature and related arts, as well as The National Imagination and a capstone, are included in the comparative literature major. You will also take two foreign language courses and demonstrate reading knowledge of a foreign language by completing a literature course in that language. Courses in the major include:

- Analyzing Stories and Poems
- Popular Culture in France
- Contemporary Literary Theory
- Japanese Pop Culture
- Comparative literature capstone
