### **Introduction to the Major**

In political science, you will examine the dynamics of conflict and consensus and explore how societies are affected by political action and inaction.

Understanding the policies and decisions that shape our lives on the local, national, and international level requires keen insight and expert analysis. You will investigate a range of issues that reverberate within and beyond Clark's campus including human rights, elections, and globalization. In line with our focus on action-based learning, you will collaborate with faculty members and peers to drive positive change through your research, internships, and service projects, at home and abroad.

#### **CORE COURSES**

All majors take courses in research methods and political theory and learn how to critically evaluate and respond to some of the most important questions for citizens in the U.S. and around the world. You will specialize in one of three tracks: American politics and public policy, comparative politics, or international relations.

- Political theory, economics, and history courses
- Research methods and skills course
- Intro and advanced courses within your track
- History course related to your track
- Intro and advanced courses outside of your track
- Capstone

#### **Explore the Political Science Department**

Talk with department faculty and staff about your interests and plans. Look into First-Year Intensive (FYI) courses.



#### Learn about campus resources

Make ClarkYou your default homepage and explore student resources related to academics, campus life, and health and wellness. Visit the Goddard library, the Writing Center, and the Career Lab in ASEC, and log in to Handshake to find career exploration events.

Meet with an adviser to start identifying courses that match your interests and goals.



#### Get connected

Learn about and get involved with student clubs and activities that resonate with you. Consider applying to the Clark chapter of Pi Sigma Alpha, the national political science honor society.



#### Explore off campus and get involved

Check out activities and opportunities in the community beyond Clark through the Office of Community Engagement and Volunteering.



#### Reflect on what sparks your interest

What new interests have you discovered? What do you want to try? Work with your adviser to start mapping out courses and activities for the next three years. Start a career journal to help track your interests and insights.



# Dig into the major and define your interests

Consider taking part in Clark's Mock Trial team to gain insight into the American legal system or join the Model United Nations program — one of the top 15 programs in the country.



#### Start networking

Join ClarkCONNECT, Clark's virtual community, to connect with alumni and explore possible internship and experiential learning projects. Visit the Career Connections Center (CCC) to learn more about internship and work opportunities.



#### **Build your resume**

Attend a workshop or schedule an individual session at the CCC for help. Upload your resume to Handshake for review and feedback.



#### Consider study abroad

Look into options for a semester, year, or summer abroad or away to broaden and deepen your experience. Visit the Study Abroad Office to explore the possibilities, including a semester in Washington, D.C.



#### Pre-flight check

Attend a career fair organized by the CCC. Search for internship and job opportunities on Handshake and meet with your career adviser.



#### Look back and look ahead

Reflect on your experiences and the skills you are developing. What do you enjoy, and do well? Which career options are you now considering, and which do you still want to explore? Add your thoughts to your career journal.

#### Plan for senior year and beyond

Talk with your advisers about your plans. Identify faculty who know you well and will serve as references or write letters of recommendation. Get your resume reviewed through the Career Lab.



#### Dive into research

Political science majors are encouraged to conduct research through independent study, an internship, or a study abroad experience. Explore department and university funding opportunities for research and creative projects, including opportunity funding.



#### No regrets!

What's on your Clark bucket list? Where do you still need to build experience and skills? Take time for things you are passionate about.



#### Pull it all together

Complete your capstone through a course project, research experience, or honors thesis. Make sure you are on track to complete all major requirements and wrap up any research projects.



#### Show your work

Present your work at ClarkFEST in the spring or fall, or at a political science conference. What other experiences can you leverage to pursue your goals?



#### What's next?

Discuss your post-graduation plans with political science faculty and your advisers. Make an appointment with your career adviser for help with your job search or applying to graduate school.



#### Get ready to launch

Participate in career-related events on and off campus. Schedule a mock job interview through the Career Connections Center to get feedback. Update your professional profiles and find ways to demonstrate qualities such as leadership, teamwork, and problem-solving.



#### Share your knowledge and give back

Work as a Peer Learning Assistant (PLA). Lead a discussion section for an introductory course. Take on a leadership role with a community organization or student club to build important skills.



#### Ask yourself the big questions

What have you learned that you value? What have you excelled at? What action steps do you need to take this year to finish strong?



## **AMPLIFY YOUR MAJOR!**

Clark's political science major is designed to help you learn outside the classroom.

Potential research funding sources include the Harrington Public Affairs Fellowship, the Zenovia Sochor Memorial Award, and the June Patron '65 Endowed Internship Award. Apply to join a faculty-led trip to Washington, D.C., to attend oral arguments at the U.S. Supreme Court. Students are encouraged to conduct research of their own or as part of a collaborative team. Many students take advantage of internship opportunities during the academic year or over the summer to connect what they're learning with their professional development.
