Introduction to the Major

The Women's and Gender Studies major (WGS) explores how gender intersects with sexuality, race, and other social identities — historically and today.

We explore the social construction of femininities and masculinities, gendered dimensions of power and institutions, and the role of patriarchy in structuring expectations around gender expression and identity, sexuality, race, and class. This interdisciplinary program incorporates perspectives from faculty across the university. From the personal to the political, from theory to practice, you will analyze and discuss diverse viewpoints and engage with issues on campus and beyond.

Together with your adviser, you will design a distinctive specialization to focus your studies. Students will complete a related minor or second major to sharpen your research and analytical skills through interdisciplinary coursework.

Year 1



Explore the WGS major

Take Introduction to Women's and Gender Studies. Meet other majors and learn key vocabulary and theories in this course. Make sure you attend the Enloe lectures and other WGS events.



Identify courses with the WGS attribute

Year 3



Pursue your specialization

To complete this requirement, you will take three courses at the 200-level and above across at least two departments.

Year 2



Declare your major and establish your **Specialization**

In WGS, you design a specialization that helps you hone your skills and knowledge across at least two disciplines. Take the methods course and other courses that build critical thinking, analytical, and communication skills.



Start networking

Attend a career fair or visit your career adviser at the Career Connections Center (CCC) to learn about potential paths and opportunities.



Prepare for undergraduate research

Work with your advisor to start planning ahead for your capstone. Will you do an internship? Design a directed study? Take a capstone seminar in your second major? You can also start to consider pursuing an honors thesis.

Year 4



Bring it all together with your capstone

All of your hard comes together in your capstone. Make sure to review your coursework and complete all degree requirements.
