CYES is an interdisciplinary major that bridges community development, critical youth studies, and education studies. Majors and minors engage in social justice praxis. Social justice praxis is a commitment to action for social change, grounded in critical analysis, strategic planning, collaboration, and learning from uncertainty. The aim of CYES is to prepare students for engaged scholarship and leadership in the 21st century, working for social justice across a range of educational, cultural, institutional and linguistic contexts. All CYES majors undertake an original, student-led research project.

GRADUATE PROGRAMS

Foundational Courses

The major requires a series of 11 courses from the departments of education, geography, history, international development, psychology, and sociology. The curriculum includes:

- One foundation course
- Three theories of understanding courses
- One research methods course
- Three elective courses
- Three courses for the praxis project and portfolio development













Year 1



Explore the department and campus

Year 3



Plan for senior year and beyond

Are you considering graduate school, pursuing a master's in teaching (MAT), or teaching in public schools? Connect with your career adviser to strategize and plan.



Find a praxis site

Based on your experiences so far, select a community site where you want to engage in your praxis project. Build relationships there and begin to establish trust.



Design your praxis project

In the spring of the third year, all CYES majors begin the three-course praxis sequence to support them in designing, implementing, and writing about their community-engaged research project.

Year 2



Declare your CYES major

Submit your two induction essays for the first CYES gateway (declaring the major) and attend the induction session. Take the CYES foundation course, Complexities of Urban Education.



Start networking

Create a LinkedIn profile and connect with alumni in fields of interest. Log in to Handshake to find an internship, job, or research opportunity. Consider joining the Alumni Job Shadow Program to testdrive different career options.

Year 4



Complete your praxis project

In the final two praxis courses, you will implement your project, gather and analyze your data, and write up your final thesis.

Throughout the major you will be guided to develop and share your digital portfolio, showcasing your work and your development as a community-engaged learner.
