Faculty Advisor PIN Release Information

As part of the advising process, students are required to meet with their faculty advisors for course selection guidance and approval. Students have been reminded to come to their advising meetings well prepared with a schedule that establishes a balanced academic load, one which the student will likely succeed. The students have also been encouraged to engage in an active conversation during their advising meetings and to ensure that they are fulfilling their graduation requirements, appropriately. It is for this reason that faculty advisors should not be releasing PINs before the start of the advising period, which starts on Monday, March 20, 2023.

Consortium Registration

Full-time (registered for at least 3.0 units) Clark undergraduate day college students may take one course each fall or spring through the Higher Education Consortium of Central Massachusetts (HECCMA). Consortium registration is permitted for sophomores, juniors, seniors, and transfer students beyond their first semester. Consortium courses must be taken for letter grade. The final grade will be calculated into the student's GPA and will count in earned units 1.0 Clark unit. Students may not enroll in a Consortium course in the same semester in which the course is being offered at Clark unless that course is filled or conflicts with a required course which the student must complete in the same semester.

All full-time students, except first year students and first semester transfer students, may enroll in one course per semester (fall or spring) at any of the following schools:

- Anna Maria College
- Assumption College
- College of the Holy Cross
- Massachusetts College of Pharmacy
- Nichols College
- Quinsigamond Community College
- Tufts University School of Veterinary Medicine
- University of Massachusetts Worcester
- Worcester Polytechnic Institute
- Worcester State College

You must get the signature of the comparable department chairperson here at Clark to ensure that this course is not a duplication of a course available at Clark and is acceptable for credit. Staff in the Academic Advising Center give approval of courses for which there is no related department at Clark.

Fifth Course Request

Juniors and seniors with a minimum of a 3.0 cumulative GPA or a minimum of a 3.0 term GPA from the most recent completed full-time semester may register for a fifth course unit at no additional cost. Sophomores with a minimum of a 3.6 cumulative GPA may also register for a fifth course at no additional cost. The standard number of units that any student may register for in a given semester is 4.5 units; the fifth course approval will raise the allowable unit maximum for the term to 5.5 units.

Fill out this form below to request permission to register for 5.0 units during the fall or spring semester. Permission to enroll in 5.0 units is only given to juniors and seniors. Sophomores who meet the GPA requirements may be considered for special approval. Repeating Courses

It is the policy of Clark University to allow students to repeat any course. However, you will only get credit for one of the courses (except in cases where the faculty designate a course as one that can earn credit more than once). Both courses will appear on the transcript but only the higher grade will be computed into the GPA. Students receiving any kind of federal or institutional aid should consult with the office of Financial Aid to determine if the repeated course/s will affect their aid eligibility.

So, if you are suffering from having a low course grade averaged into your cumulative GPA, you can repeat the course for a better grade and a boost to your cumulative GPA.

NEW! Spring Course Withdrawal Policy & Deadline

The last day for **undergraduate students** to withdraw from a course with a grade of “W” is Monday, May 1, 2023. If you fail to withdraw by this deadline, you will receive your earned grade for that course.

Effective this spring 2023 semester, students will meet with an advisor to discuss the course withdrawal and receive a signature on their course withdrawal form before they submit it to the Registrar’s Office. First-year students will have their First Year Success Advisor sign the form; upper-class students can have their faculty advisor **or** an advisor from the Academic Advising Center sign their form. (We also encourage upper-class students to discuss the course withdrawal with their faculty advisor.)

As a reminder, the First Year Success Advisors are located in suite 107D in the Academic Commons, and the Academic Advising Center is located on the second floor of the Alumni and Student Engagement Center. Both offices are open Monday – Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Are you planning to take a course outside of Clark?

To receive credit for courses taken outside of Clark, students must fill out a Transfer Credit Approval Form.

Students are required to attach a catalog course description or syllabus for each course listed on the completed form. Courses cannot be evaluated without the description or syllabus. Students should also fill out the form and begin the process for approval well in advance of the registration deadline of the host institution in order to avoid process delays and other potential problems.

If a student is requesting major, minor or concentration credit, they must obtain the signature of the appropriate department chair on the form before submitting it to the Academic Advising center. advising@clarku.edu

Any student requesting a course be evaluated to fill a Program of Liberal Studies (PLS) requirement must identify which course and which PLS they are looking to fill on this form.

A maximum of two courses may be taken over the summer. Students must receive a grade of C or higher in order to earn Clark credit. Remember, the grade itself doesn't transfer to Clark, just the credit. So, taking an off-campus course doesn't affect your Clark GPA.

Transfer Credit Conversion

- **A 4-credit-hour course is equivalent to 1 Unit at Clark.**
- **A 3-credit-hour course would convert to .75 Units at Clark.**

Major Declaration

Exception Policy & College Board Petitions

Exceptions to particular university regulations and degree requirements will be considered only if there is no prohibition stated in this catalog. Where exceptions are specifically prohibited, none will be granted. A student who wants an individual exception must follow the procedure specified in this catalogue for the particular regulation or requirement. If no procedure is specified, it may still be possible to request an exception. Such exceptions, however, are rarely granted.

Requests for exception to established university academic regulations or procedures are generally heard by: (1) the College Board; (2) the dean or director of the office responsible for administering the policy; or (3) the chair of the academic unit in which the student is seeking a degree. Students who wish to request an exception should first consult the Academic Advising Center about the appropriate process to follow.

While the university is sensitive to the educational advantages of a flexible curriculum, it is also conscious of a responsibility to ensure equity for all students. Permission to deviate from published regulations is neither automatic nor pro forma; each request is considered on its own merits and in light of the petitioner's complete academic record.

Plagiarism

As we approach the end of the semester, you will likely be writing papers for your classes. Take a few minutes now to remind yourself of Clark University's policy on plagiarism: [Click Here](#)

Students who are found guilty of plagiarism or other forms of cheating will face serious penalties for such actions. While the most common sanction is failure in the course, students have also been suspended or expelled. Clearly, any short-term advantage has the potential for a very negative long-term consequence. **Don't put your academic career in jeopardy!**

What is plagiarism?

Clark University's Undergraduate Advising Handbook, defines plagiarism as the "presentation of someone else's work as one's own." This means that you are violating the university's policy of academic integrity whether you intentionally, or unintentionally take the credit for someone else's ideas and words.

Do not hand in a paper that has been written by someone else. If you buy a paper, download a paper from the Internet, or borrow a paper from a friend, you violate Clark University's academic integrity policy. You have also missed the opportunity to present your own, original ideas to the academic community. You have essentially silenced yourself.

Remember that plagiarism also includes the use of another's words or ideas without giving proper attribution to your source. Identifying your source's names along with the date of the publication may not prevent you from violating the principles of academic integrity if you have taken material

liberally from that source. Using language directly from another source always requires the use of quotation marks.

Do not allow the pressure of course assignments to lead you into cutting corners. Getting caught violating academic integrity will result in far more negative consequences than will submitting a less than perfect paper.

Remember, Clark University's Writing Center consultants, who have expertise in a number of disciplines, are available to help you at any stage of the writing process, whether you are just beginning your research, you are in the early stages of drafting your ideas, or you want advice about how to best document your sources.

Tutoring Offerings this Semester

Student Accessibility Services (SAS) & Testing Center

Happy Spring Semester! We encourage all students registered with Student Accessibility Services (SAS) to share their academic accommodations this semester. If you have not done so already, you must give our office permission to send your new faculty a copy of your accommodation letter by completing SAS's [Academic Accommodation Consent Form](#). A link to this form can be found on the SAS website under the [SAS Forms Tab](#).

As we approach midterm exams, please remember to communicate your decisions around test taking in a timely manner. SAS requires students to complete the [Test Relocation Form](#) a minimum of 5 business days in advance of the scheduled exam date (**two weeks in advance for midterms and finals**) should they opt to access the SAS Testing Center. Alternatively, students have the right to coordinate their testing accommodations with their professor directly. If you do not wish to test with SAS, we encourage you to begin initiating conversations with your professors as soon as possible to begin coordinating how you may utilize your academic accommodations with their support.

Strategic Learning Services (SLS)

The **Strategic Learning Services** program (SLS) supports any students on campus who may need assistance with executive functioning skills, time management, organization, or other areas of academic challenge. Data strongly suggests this type of structured and targeted support program helps to support and enhance participating students' ability to acclimate to the college community and has increased retention. Over a 6-year period, students enrolled in a similar program retained at a 12-17% higher rate than other individuals within their same cohort who did not participate. In addition, supported students earned a similar GPA to their peers in the overall population, and a majority graduated along with their respective cohorts.

Students may enroll in the SLS program at various points in their time at the institution and commit to meeting with a Strategic Learning Services Coach twice per week during fall and spring semesters. The SLS Coach helps students review course work and assignments, determines the need for connection to additional campus support services to facilitate overall success at the institution, and helps students increase their ability to self-advocate and build skills for independence both in and out of the classroom setting. Coaches assess students' progress throughout the semester to ensure they are meeting their identified goals, a critical process that helps students build on their successes and actively engage in the learning process. All sessions between the coach and the student are documented to concretely identify and actively work on areas of need and growth. Most students participate in the program for two or three semesters, though some students may require more time in the program to support their success.

First Year Success Advising (FYSA) Unit

Every incoming first-year student is paired with a First Year Success Advisor (FYSA), a professional staff person who will support a student's transition into the Clark community through their first year until they declare a major. Working in partnership with the FYI (first year intensive) faculty advisor and the Peer Mentors, the FYSA is a student's go-to person for

anything they made need at Clark, including: answering questions about getting involved on and off campus; helping students understand and get connected to services and supports offered at Clark; guiding them to the proper resources and people; assisting students with course selection (along with the faculty advisor); and clarifying any and all institutional policies. Students stay connected with their FYSA by meeting with them at least once per semester, and should feel free to contact them with any question or concern.

Study Abroad

Spring, 2024 Study Abroad: Students wishing to study abroad in the Spring of '24 should plan to submit their applications by September 15th, 2023. Before doing so, students should submit an interest form (found on our website clarku.edu/studyabroad). Applications for Spring '23 study abroad will open later in the semester.

- **Requirements:** Clark University requires that prior to your applying to a program, you must:
 - Attend a Study Abroad & Away 101
 - Be a full-time student at Clark for at least one year
 - Declare a major and have an advisor in that major
 - Meet the requirements of your major and your study abroad program
 - Be in good academic, financial, and social standing

Study Abroad 101

The Department of Computer Science – NEWS!

The Department of Computer Science will be moving into **the new Center for Media Arts, Computing, and Design** with a targeted opening of Fall 2023. It will provide a space for innovation and interdisciplinary collaboration across Data Science, Computer Science, Math, Economics, Geography/GIS, and Management. The new building will include many novel features such as a multimedia gallery, an augmented reality/virtual reality lab, a video game library for interactive media research, a makerspace, a human-computer interaction lab, a robotics lab, and a data science lab. These labs will provide a space for students to engage in research with faculty on various topics including human factors in computer systems, privacy-enhancing technologies, data visualization systems, next-generation network architectures, etc.

Students and faculty will also have the opportunity to showcase their entrepreneurial innovations and prototyping in the highly accessible Innovation and Maker Space which will house flexible build-tables for prototyping electronics and products, and will come with soldering stations, embroidery and sewing machines, 3D printers, and laser cutters. The building will also include the UX/UI rooms for User Experience and Interface studies, which will have data-gathering instruments such as eye-tracking and head-tracking systems, and the ability to record mouse movements. Additionally, Clark students will have the opportunity to use the state-of-the-art labs and industry-standard software to design their own research or desired track.



Philosophy Department Open House
